## Prime-Time Science: The Beginning of a Beautiful Friendship?

The portrayal of science has often posed a challenge to Hollywood. Though it has provided some of the compelling storylines, the many complexities of science (and scientists) have confounded even the most talented writer or director, pitting creative license against scientific accuracy again and again.
