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**A Measurement of the Nuclear Levels in  $^{19}\text{Ne}$  using GODDESS**

MATTHEW HALL, University of Notre Dame, ATLAS EXPERIMENT 1488 COLLABORATION COLLABORATION — A direct way to test nova explosion models is to observe gamma rays created in the decay of radioactive isotopes produced in the nova. One such isotope,  $^{18}\text{F}$ , is believed to be the main source of observable 511-keV gamma rays. The main destruction mechanism of  $^{18}\text{F}$  is thought to be the  $^{18}\text{F}(p,\alpha)^{15}\text{O}$  reaction, and the uncertainty in the reaction rate is attributed to uncertainties in the energies, spins, and parities of the nuclear levels in  $^{19}\text{Ne}$  above the proton threshold. A  $^3\text{He}$  beam was used at Argonne National Lab in an effort to understand the levels in  $^{19}\text{Ne}$  via the  $^{19}\text{F}(^3\text{He},t)^{19}\text{Ne}$  reaction. Gammasphere ORRUBA Dual Detectors for Experimental Structure Studies (GODDESS) was used to measure gamma rays from the decay of  $^{19}\text{Ne}$  in coincidence with the reaction tritons. Preliminary data from the experiment will be presented.
